8. How long have you been doing the HoLa Festival?

We reached our 10th year milestone in 2009. Our Festival Committee includes several artists, business owners, and educational professionals in various fields such as TV, translation, teaching.

9. Describe the Hola Festival.

The Hola Festival is a family-oriented day-long celebration of diversity and a cultural salute to our East Tennessee community. The festival is known for its rich mix of music, dance, food, arts, tradition, crafts, and its unique **Parade of Nations**. This visual treat highlights with its varied and colorful costumes of Spain, Latin America and the Caribbean. The **Countries and Heritage** exhibits provide for a one-of-a-kind educational experience.

Children are very important to Latino families and a central part of the HoLa festival involves activities for them. Clowns, puppets, and new this year, **Storytelling** will add to the educational value of our event. Performers include a well balanced mix of different music styles, demonstrations of traditional dances, and public-engaging classes such as Salsa, Tango and Flamenco. **Orquesta MaCuba** will entertain the crowds with a huge concert and street dance.

The Community Fair section offers an important opportunity for non-profit organizations to share important information with the community. Participants include American Red Cross, Knox County Public Library, YWCA, Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Immigration Center, Health Department, Legal Aid of ET, KAPA (Knoxville Area Project Access), TIRRC, March of Dimes, and others. Furthermore, the **Annual Resource Guide** offers another opportunity for sponsors, advertisers, and organizations serving Hispanics to reach out.

The Hola Festival is a fun event that appeals to the taste of all! Attendance last year was 50% Hispanic. It offers a unique and an important opportunity for meaningful interaction.

10. List the ways that your event/program will benefit the community including who it will benefit.

Hispanic Heritage Month is a designation established by an act of Congress to acknowledge the many contributions of Hispanics in the United States. It is celebrated nationwide from September 15 through October 15. It is important recognize the local Hispanic community and its contributions to the area.

It is also important to showcase the existing diversity in the Knoxville area and to send a message that we are a tolerant community that not only accepts, but also celebrates the diversity amongst us. Having the festival on Market Square helps us bring together segments of the community that would not otherwise come together to interact.

In terms of economic development, the HoLa Festival is becoming a touristic attraction! Festival participants come as far as from neighboring states, which speaks to the quality of the event. Local companies looking to bring potential employers to the area would benefit from pointing out to the Hola Festival as an example of such diversity. In 2009, *50% of festival-goers were Hispanic*, which provides for a unique opportunity for sponsors to market products and services, or to recruit bilingual employees. This event will culturally enrich our community, while promoting the revitalization of downtown.

11. Describe your target audience for the Hola Festival.

Since having the festival at Market Square for the past three years, we have seen an increase in the diversity of the people who come to it. We offer activities that are of interest to families, students, anybody who is interested in the Spanish language, the Hispanic culture, or those planning business or trips to those countries.

The authenticity of the food, performances, and Heritage booths attracts Hispanics of various socioeconomic levels. This is a huge success for us because not only we get to enjoy our music, food and tradition, and teach it to our children or grand-children, but we also get to share it with people who might not otherwise have an opportunity to experience it! We are happy to increase Knoxville's knowledge of the Hispanic culture. The Parade of the Nations attracts people of Hispanic origin coming from places as far as Atlanta. It is our goal to emphasize the diversity within our Hispanic culture for everyone to enjoy.
